April 23-29 is National Volunteer Week



Blue Water Filling Station Installed

When the Flint water crisis broke last year, the response we got from all over the world was overwhelming and through the crisis we have built heartwarming relationships with the most amazing people and the organizations they represent. One such relationship is with Blue Water, a Swedish based company that believes, as do we, that access to clean drinking water is a human right. Their passion is to deliver contaminant free drinking water from the tap using the worlds best water purification technologies. Last year, they came and fitted our North End Soup Kitchen with a complete water purification system.



Owosso celebrated the opening of their new location on March 31st hope you were able to make it to the Open House! It was a great success and we appreciate everyone who came out to show their support! The staff in Owosso would like to thank Greg Coulter and his crew for all the hard work they did for the move, stating 'Without them, we would have been lost. Greg continues to be a great help with our office move.' The American Red Cross has relocated it's offices as of March 22. We are very happy to share the space with them! The new office is at 1480 N. M-52, Ste 1, Owosso.



Amazing right?! In March they came again to install a filling station so that people can refill gallon containers. We are grateful to the people at Blue Water for their generous support during a time of great need.



The Flint Water Recovery Group, also known as the Community Partners Group, is a partnership of the more than 120 nonprofits, churches, grass-root organizations, individuals and residents that are working together to create short, intermediate, and long term solutions related to the crisis. It is a wealth of information, providing information on everything from job opportunities, gardening in flint, caring for your pets, recycling water bottles, getting filters and much, much more.

The Flint water crisis may not be in the daily headlines anymore but the aftermath is still ongoing. We would like to take an opportunity to highlight **www.flintcares. com.** Flint Cares was created out of the Flint Water Recovery Group as a way to provide Flint residents with the most accurate, up-to-date and trustworthy information regarding the water crisis.

We are continuing our recovery efforts here at Catholic Charities and would like to share with you a letter we received which touched our hearts and we hope her words inspire you.

Dear Ms. Schultz,

My heart was so deeply moved when I read the article in our Sunday Visitor newspaper about the water crisis happening in Flint. I am a former Michigan resident. I moved away when I married in 1981. Being a military wife has taught me many skills but my most valued ones are the grace filled skills and gifts I've learned throughout my Catholic faith. As I mentioned the article tore at my heart. Michigan will always be my home at heart. My parents lived in the Flint area when they first married in 1953. I still remember their fond memories of that time.

I took the article to my parish of St. Elizabeth Ann Seton in Florida, ladies guild meeting. Everyone in attendance agreed to find what we could from our works of charities account. Please accept our check of \$300 and my personal check of \$20. I wish I could send more but things are tight since my husband passed away six years ago. So many trials everywhere in our world... I pray this brings comfort and relief to those in most need. I am aware the government is supplying aid, but also aware that not all needs are met immediately

God bless you in all your daily labors and serving God's most precious lambs. It takes a special heart to hear their bleating. I will keep you and all your staff and volunteers in my prayers. I pray daily for those who suffer and are in need of God's mercy. It touches my heart when Jesus reveals the names and faces of his suffering ones. I try to live this saying the army soldiers live by...leave no comrade behind' My husband was in the army for 21 years and I now have my middle son of 10 years service in the army keeping this service so alive. No one in need, no matter what that need is, should be left behind. I will try to send a little something when I can and will keep the prayers ever in the fore front of my heart for you all. May God's strength and peace envelope you in this extraordinary jubilee of God's Mercy.

27 Years! Mr. Gaines Gardening PLUS Program

The Mr. Gaines Gardening PLUS Program is about to begin its 27th season! This program has gone from strength to strength thanks in large part to your support. Young people from across the county have received training and mentoring over the years creating opportunities where once there



were none. In 2013 the program added a culinary and nutrition component. The program now has come full circle in teaching the youth not only how to grow, tend and harvest, but also how to sell, and even cook a nutritious meal! In 2016, the program expanded to two new garden sites at NESK, located on Flints north side adjacent to the Agency's North End Soup Kitchen. The program continues to work with at-risk youth, teaching the youth life skills through positive role modeling and job mentoring while educating the youth on grief and loss, self-esteem, and substance use prevention. Many of the youth have gone on to pursue education in horticulture, culinary services and many





have gained employment opportunities after the program ends, becoming a positive force in the community. The St. Patricks Day festivities kicked off in spectacular fashion with our annual St. Patricks Day Boxed Lunch fundraiser completely selling out! (top tip for next year, get

your pre-order in early!) We were able to sell all 2300 lunches and would like to extend a big Irish 'Go raibh maith agat' (thanks) to everyone who participated!

In true Irish fashion, the traditional Irish mass started at 12:02 p.m. (because the Irish are notoriously late), held at St. Michael Catholic Church. Bishop Earl Boyea of the Catholic Diocese of Lansing and area priests offered the liturgy honoring St. Patrick. Just before mass **The Ancient Order of Hibernians awarded our very own**

President/CEO, Vicky Schultz, the 2017 Community Award for her remarkable work with Flint's most vulnerable.





The Protestant Reformation that swept Europe in the 16th century was marked by Royal intrigues over control of the Roman Church's wealth, and conflicts over which

religion could be practiced. The Queen of England, Elizabeth I, declared the Church of England to be the State religion, and considered Ireland part of her state. Most Irish did not agree. The Papacy launched a counter-reformation and Ireland became a battlefield



between the two forces as the Irish, who embraced the Church introduced by St. Patrick, became the target of a campaign to reduce Rome's power by converting the masses to Protestantism. The persistence with which the Irish clung to their religion drove the English to extremes in repression. Not surprisingly, secret societies were formed to protect the values under attack. Each society included in its avowed purpose, the protection of the Roman Church and its clergy. Due to the secret nature of these organizations, history provides us with little information about these societies.

What history does tell us however, is that continued oppression and periodic crop failures forced many Irish to flee to other lands for survival. The inclination toward secret societies which had developed in Ireland by now became an Irish defense mechanism, especially among those emigrants committed to the ethnic slums of the lands to which they fled. In early nineteenth century America, the Ancient Order of Hibernians with its motto Friendship, Unity, and Christian Charity

> became the most recent link in the evolution of those ancient societies. Organized with the same intention of defending Gaelic values under attack, it can claim continuity of purpose and motto unbroken back to the Defenders of 1565. The need for a defensive society in

America was the same as it was in Ireland.


The early AOH in America remained a defensive, yet secret, society, and while little is known of its specific activities, it is

known that it assisted Irish immigrants in obtaining jobs and social services. Membership was wellguarded and restricted to Irish-born. Even minutes books used member numbers instead of names to protect identities.

AOH now stands, not only as the oldest Catholic Lay organization in America, but the largest Irish Catholic

society in the world with Divisions across the United States, and close ties with the AOH in Ireland, England, Scotland, and Wales. Annual dances, concerts, and parades sponsored at all levels of the Order raise millions for charity while providing a showcase for the positive contributions the Irish have made in every walk of American life.

In the last 10 years The AOH in Flint has raised over \$300,000 for local charities. Their next fundraising event will be the Shellelagh Swing, a golf outing on Saturday, June 17th at the Copperridge Golf Course in Davison. The proceeds for the event go to Catholic Charities, The Disability Network, Special Olympics, The Shriners Burn Unit, Fr. Kohler's Cancer Camp (kids with cancer) and St. Lukes New Life Center. You believed in our dream, and understood our vision of a place where the most vulnerable members of our community could come together for Help and Hope, and now the dream is coming true. Renovation of our Sr. Claudia Burke Center for Hope is underway!

The necessary demolition is nearly complete, and now the real work of transforming the 1953 portion of the former St. Michael School building into a functional community center begins. Vital updates are being made to ensure the legacy of the building, and create an attractive, highly functional space that continues to

welcome residents who seek our help, regardless of their faith or situation in life.

Our community continues to struggle against ongoing economic turmoil and the ongoing water crisis recovery. We believe the Center for Hope will play an essential role in reaching out to those in need and giving them a hand up toward a brighter, healthier future. We are closer to the day when our doors will open to a beautiful, fully accessible facility. Soon, we will provide shower and laundry facilities, programs that teach nutrition and parenting, a warming center that shelters the homeless through the winter months, and a hot meal served every day of the year. Our Community Closet will offer clothing, blankets, personal needs and household items to warm homes and hearts, and our collaborative partner, Hamilton Health Network, will open a "micro clinic" on the second floor to provide basic

medical services and health information — completing a circle of basic needs and support for the most vulnerable among us.

Together, our efforts at the Center for Hope will deliver a powerful message that the families and people of our community are important, that we can change what many feel is unchangeable-we can bring hope and change to Flint, one life at a time, forever changing our future. Gifts to Catholic Charities Center for Hope help to make basic services possible for those in our community who struggle every day for water to drink, food for their children and a safe place where people care. Today, we are closing a funding gap of less than \$100,000 and are planning to complete construction by late summer 2017 with a grand re-opening in September!

KID'S SUMMER

Now in its 20th year, the NESK Kids Camp has been providing academic as well as recreational activities for children in Flint. It all started in 1995 when there were children coming to the North End Soup Kitchen to eat without a parent or guardian with them. The Director, John Manse, with the help of a few volunteers, decided to have the kids play in the gym above the soup kitchen after lunch. In 1996 funds were provided through a grant from the Community Foundation of Flint Greater Flint, the Flint Genesee Chamber of Commerce, to hire teenagers to help during the summer months through the Summer Youth Initiative. The grant enabled The North End Soup Kitchen (NESK) run by Catholic Charities to give the small campers a safe, loving and learning environment during the summer months, Monday – Friday, 7 hours each day.

The program has continued to be a success and today the campers enjoy breakfast, lunch, and participate in fun, educational lessons. They go on field trips throughout the summer that teach them about nutrition, smoke and fire safety training, anti-alcohol and tobacco use, and many other useful life lessons. This year, the camp will team up with Genesee Health System to provide Anti-Bully Camp during the last week. We also celebrate the importance of family at camp by holding Family Fun Fridays! The Pizza Party is for the entire family, and includes a bounce house and other fun activities EVERY FRIDAY! Each family will receive a bag of food and cleaning supplies to take home. Lastly, at graduation, the campers receive a graduation certificate and a school bag full of school supplies! The camp is entirely free to the campers making it an amazing opportunity!
